At this critical point, these men chose to act: **to feed and clothe the little ones and find them proper care.** As a result of that event, Amarillo Children's Home officially opened in March 1924.

our speciality is kids who are more challenging to find a home for, such as sibling groups and older teens





Retirement is often seen as a time to kick back and relax, to take up new hobbies, to have a well-earned period of leisure after a long career. For Jeff Wilkerson, retirement has meant a transition to nearly full-time volunteer work in the maintenance department at Amarillo Children's Home.

Originally from Clovis, New Mexico, Jeff served at the police departments in Portales and Amarillo and at the New Mexico Department of Public Safety in Santa Fe before retiring to Amarillo. Once back in the Texas Panhandle, Jeff began volunteering in 2013 at Snack Pak 4 Kids. He came to ACH in Feb 2015, doubling our maintenace staff.

Right away, Jeff and Maintenance Manager Brad Bonzer hit it off, and the lively duo is often seen driving around campus on a golf cart as they head from project to project. The care and keeping of 7 cottages, 19 vehicles, several other campus buildings and the campus grounds keep the two of them hopping.

"The way I look at it," Jeff shared, "we're directly involved with the health, safety, and welfare of the kids... the safety and wellbeing of the kids is what I care about."

Jeff expressed that helping here comes from a place of love – he really enjoys handyman work, and serving ACH kids in this way gives him joy and enhances the quality of his life. He most enjoys summer when the teen boys help with a few projects. If the kids have an interest, Jeff likes to engage them and foster their natural inquisitiveness.

Jeff is a fixer of broken things, a mender, a restorer. We are so grateful he has chosen to join our family.

WHO ARE YOU?

It's a question which has pervaded Robert Villegas' life in ways he never expected when he first heard it voiced from a houseparent at Amarillo Children's Home in 2001. "Who are you?" he was asked at age 14, sitting around the 50-year-old, 14-seater dining room table in Union Cottage. It struck him as a meaningful question then, and has remained so throughout his life. As a young teen, he recognized it to mean those asking cared about him and were in for the long haul. He later came to regard the question as his guiding star, indicating, "These people are asking the right questions. This is where I want to be."

"Who are you now?" Buddy Fox, Robert's elementary school principal turned college mentor, asked when Robert was questioning his career path. "Who are you?" he has been asked in every job interview in which he accepted the job. "Who are you?" he has been asked repeatedly by people who have spoken life into him.

So, who is Robert Villegas? At first glance, Robert is a suit-wearing Freshman principal at Palo Duro High School, an energetic father of 3, helper to an autistic brother, a success. A deeper look reveals a man full of passion who thrives on helping others succeed, who has big dreams and the drive to achieve them.

The late Guy Saunders, a life-long friend of Amarillo Children's Home who was highly engaged with ACH during Robert's years here, told him, "You're going to make an impact in the world no one has seen before, but you just don't know it yet. So be you. When you're you, everyone around you is a better them."

During his years at Amarillo Children's Home, Robert discovered he is a light for people – that his outlook changes how others see. He found out he comes alive when he gets to help others grow. He aquired life skills which have served him well. "One of the most impactful things I learned was greeting others. It doesn't seem like a big deal, but it's so important. There is something to be said about making people feel comfortable around you. When you take that first step, that initiative to bring someone in, it makes all the difference for those around you." He learned these things because he was at ACH.

"There is a negative phenomenon in the foster care 'system' - as a 'system' it's processing kids. When you process kids, the other side of that is prison - that's the adult version of the 'system.' ACH doesn't process kids; they build relationships with kids. They are building *life-long* relationships. I am a better person today because I lived at Amarillo Children's Home - they taught me to be more than *just a foster kid*. I found my identity. I know who I am, and a lot of that is because people at ACH showed me. They showed me I was somebody, that I mattered. Now I want to do the same thing for other people. That's who I am"



Even though I've been through so much, I haven't let it define me.

I keep going, and I think that makes me pretty strong.

I am kind, open-minded and articulate. I make people smile.

I love helping people.

I was adopted in 2020, but a little bit after that, my adoptive Dad kicked me out. Since then, I haven't had a real home. I moved from friend's house to teacher's house to motel. I'm 18, so I'm considered too old for foster care, but I'm still in high school. I just want to be able to go to school and not worry that someone will kick me out or that I'm going to overstay my welcome.

I want to graduate high school. I want to go to Amarillo College, get certified as a phlebotomist and work in a hospital. I'm good with people, and I've learned to calm myself so that the person I'm working with becomes calm. I think I'm going to be good at this.

I'm a hard worker. I want to save up enough money to buy a car – at least one reliable enough to drive back and forth to school and to my job.

Living at Amarillo Children's Home the past few months, I have learned so much about friendship and feeling safe. I am able to concentrate on school and work because I'm not worried about where I'm going to sleep or how I'm going to eat.

I've learned not everyone in life is going to hurt you.

I've learned asking for help doesn't make you weak.

I've learned being myself is not only OK, it's what I'm meant to do.

I'm learning more about who I am, and I'm becoming more authentically me.
