In 1923, Dr. R. Thomsen, minister for today's First Presbyterian Church, and some friends were meeting for coffee. They saw 3 children crying outside, orphaned and hungry. At this critical point, these men chose to act: to feed and clothe the little ones and find them proper care. As a result of that event, Amarillo Children's Home officially opened in March 1924.



our specialty is kids who are more challenging to find a home for, such as sibling groups and older teens



Our kids live in a home with a professional parenting couple aided by a dedicated assistant, prn assistants who work as needed and night-staff for expert 24-hour care. Our houseparents aren't trying to balance work and caring for children, this is their calling and their job.

The loving staff in each of our cottages are the hands and feet of God to our kids – they are the vessels through which healing comes. With the full-time mission of restoring the identity of children - through means as simple as making meals as a family and as complex as ministering peace to broken hearts who have suffered beyond what is imaginable - "the workman is worthy of his wages." 

UNCONDITIONAL LOVE

An apt picture of foster care comes from Dr. Shirley Thomas, professor, pastor's wife and foster/adoptive mom of more than 100 kids. She would tell this story regarding one of her foster daughters –

"I had no trouble getting her to call me mother," she'd say.

"It was getting her to leave off that other word that was so hard."

Pright. Beautiful. Chatty. Effervescent. Serena* is a force of nature. She feels big; shows her feelings big. Six months ago, when discussing her time here at Amarillo Children's Home, she couldn't express enough *her belief* that she was in the right place until she could be adopted, *her confidence* in what she had learned and how she had grown during her time here and *her hope* that every foster child could someday encounter the unconditional love she has experienced here... *but then*...

Events which were not caused by ACH, or even within our control, but which occured during her time here – events not limited to, but including, multiple failed hopes for adoption – soured her once enthusiastic viewpoint. Hope deferred makes the heart sick, and Serena was filled with a volcano of grief turned to fury that erupted over those who love her. It would not be quieted.

LOVE IS PATIENT... IT IS NOT EASILY ANGERED, IT KEEPS NO RECORD OF WRONGS... IT PERSEVERES.

Serena's House Parents loved her through it all. The staff loved her through it all. Even so, there came a point in time when it was clear that she needed a change of scenery and people. She had closed her ears to us, and would no longer hear our voices when we tried to remind her who she is. She needed a fresh start.

Serena had dreamt of her quinceañera since we had known her, and her 15th birthday was approaching, but not soon enough. We wanted our last extravagant act of love before she left to be a fulfillment of that longing of her heart. We delayed her departure as long as we could to have sufficient time to prepare. Other plans were set aside, vacations were postponed, sacrifices were made as House Parents and staff toiled to honor Serena in a beautiful way.

We wanted to remind her once more of her worth. We saw the black and white of the matter – her behaviors did not *earn* a party; she did not do anything *deserving of* a celebration. But just as our lives do not merit God's love, mercy or action on our behalf, her struggles would not keep us from celebrating her as a beautiful creation of God.

SHE IS A BEAUTIFUL CREATION OF GOD. SHE IS VALUABLE AND LOVEABLE. SHE IS VALUED. SHE IS LOVED.

Special Note: At the 11th hour, an associate of ACH started the process for Serena to live in their home for potential adoption. We don't know what the future holds, but we hope with her this will be her forever home. No matter what happens, we'll be here for her. Once an ACH kid, always an ACH kid.

Hope first came to Amarillo Childrens Home over 10 years ago when she was seven – the youngest of five siblings who became part of our family. ACH is unique in our ability to keep brothers and sisters together, even with a wide-spread age span. We adored this little bunch – poured into them, celebrated them and worked to keep those familial ties strong.

When the sibling group was adopted five years later, we waved goodbye with tears in our eyes and hope in our hearts.

When they stumbled back to us, wounded and shell-shocked from the failure of that adoption, we worked to nuture them back to emotional health. And when it became clear Hope needed more closely-supervised care than we could offer her, we made the hard decision to let go once more.

Kids leave ACH for all kinds of reasons – some return home or go to live with a relative, some graduate and decide to move out on their own, some are adopted and, sadly, a few need a different environment and we have to recognize we aren't what is best for them at the time.

Our doors do not close to our kids. If an ACH kid once again needs a place to live, we find a spot for them if at all possible.

When Hope was able to move back, our answer was an unequivicable, "YES!" No question.

When she arrived on campus, staff who had known her since she was seven – who knew the details of her difficult journey, and who knew the power of being known and unconditionally loved – full-on ran across campus to hug her and express joy at her return.

When she smiled broadly and relaxed into the hugs and the welcome, it was obvious to everyone – she was so glad to be home.

There's a quote I once had on my wall when I worked at Amarillo Children's Home several years ago: "Every act of extravagant love answers the only question everyone really has about your faith." One of our former Roots & Wings speakers, Bob Goff, said this, and I believe it perfectly encapsulates what we do here at Amarillo Children's Home.

Extravagant love in the face of deep pain and hardship is what first drew me to Amarillo Children's Home about 15 years ago. I became enamored with the way our staff love our kids... because it's not the way most of us do it. It's hard not to take it personally when we are disrespected, called names, and rejected.

Yet our House Parents deal with this regularly. I remember one House Parent telling me every time one of her kids said to her, "I hate you," she responded with "But I love you." It's exactly how I imagine Jesus would do it. It's sacrificial, extravagant and completely counter-cultural, and it makes this little patch of land on 34th street one of the most beautiful places on earth. We all get to see the Kingdom of God come on earth as it is in heaven right here.

Our mission statement is "To restore the identity of children so they can realize their great value and be a blessing to others." As a follower of Christ, I often think about how this is my personal mission too. Daily I must remember my own God-given identity and the value Christ placed within me so I can bless others. This is true for all of us who call ourselves children of God. Daily here at ACH, we work to show our kids who God made them to be, we teach them they are made in God's image and thus have infinite value and we aspire to help them bless others.
